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This Week In New Zealand.

Recycling seems to be a popular topic in the news at the moment. With New Zealand promoting a clean, green, image to the rest of the world surely recycling has to be one of the priorities in our efforts. The Kaipara District Council website has nothing on its homepage about this subject (nor for that matter is there a search feature available)! Maybe we as a community should

be taking a proactive interest in this very important subject and creating jobs at the same time?? New Internet Browser from Microsoft

Microsoft are testing a new version of Microsoft Internet Explorer. It is known as Internet Explorer 8. Microsoft has not set an official release date for IE 8. The company released Internet Explorer 7 in October 2006. Microsoft provided a glimpse at the new features in IE 8. One feature is called “Activities,” which lets users highlight text on a web page and then take that passage into another web service. For example, a user can highlight an address on a website and, then in one click, call up a map of that location.

Meanwhile last month, Firefox released a test version of [Firefox 3](#), an updated version of its internet browser, promising better security, more speed and stability, along with new features like a “smart” location bar that remembers and redirects users to website addresses they have visited before.

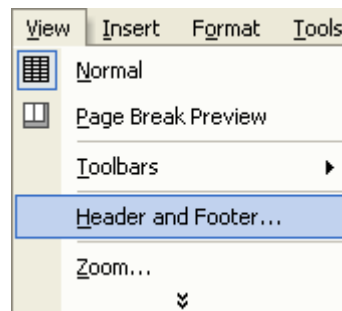
Firefox is closely affiliated with Microsoft archrival Google, which provided around 85 per cent of the revenue of Firefox's parent organisation, the Mozilla Foundation, according to filings published last October.

How to add A Picture into Header/Footer in Excel

In MS Excel header and footer option is used to display the repeated graphics or text on the top or bottom of each page in a document. You can insert a picture (company logo or other related picture) in the bottom or top margin of each page. For reference, you can add the data, time and path for where you saved Excel file on your computer or on any network server. Both the header and the footer are displayed in print layout view and save your time to enter the same items in pages again and again. You can use the same header and footer throughout a document or change the

header and footer for part of the document.

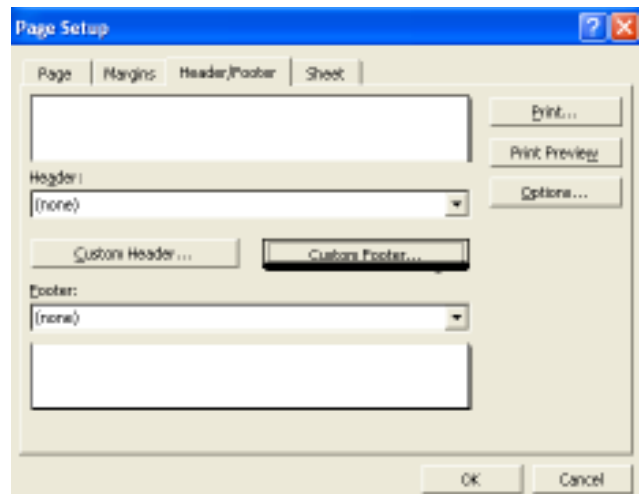
You can leave the header or footer for the first page and can also use different headers and footers on odd and even pages or for part of a document.



To apply a header or footer, follow these steps.

Select “Header and Footer” from View menu, “Header and Footer” Floating Toolbar will appear. The header and footer sections of document

are also activated.



Now under Header/Footer tab, click on Custom Header or Footer button then select left section.

To insert the picture, click on Picture icon (the 2nd icon from the right side) to select the company logo or picture that you want to add.



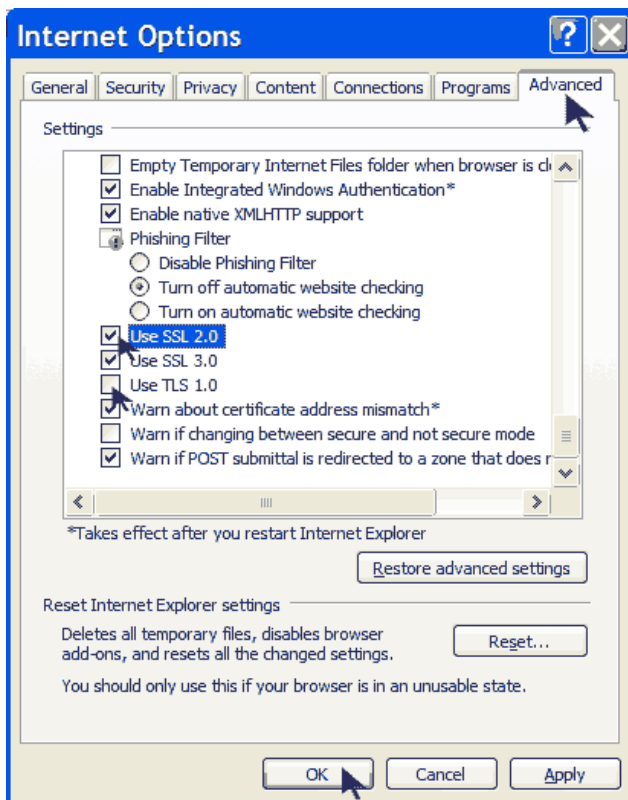

Select other options if required, for example you can add date, time file name and file path also. Click Ok button to finish the process.

How to increase the Browsing and Downloading speed in Windows Vista?

With windows Vista you may have noticed the slow internet speed. The web browsing and downloading speed is very slow when compared to previous versions of Windows. Don't worry if you don't understand the tech jargon which follows – it's been added for the more computer savvy! Just follow the steps!



To increase Microsoft Vista browsing speed:

First go to Advance tab in Internet Explorer (Tools/Internet Options) and turn off the TLS (Transport Layer Security) encryption option. This will fix problem with some secure pages. Also turn on the SSL 2.0 (Secure Sockets Layer) feature and click Ok button to close it.

In Windows Vista, the TCP autotuning feature is enabled by default. Some web servers do not respond

properly to this feature, so it appears that some sites open very slowly. To fix this, you will need to be logged into your computer with administrative rights. First click on Start button and type CMD in Run option then press Enter.

At Command Prompt, type the following command and press enter.

```
netsh interface tcp set global autotuninglevel= disabled
```

This command will disable the TCP autotuning feature. Now close the Command Prompt and restart your computer after any changes to go into effect.

If you want to restore these settings, open the Command Prompt again and type:

```
netsh interface tcp set global autotuninglevel= normal
```

and press Enter

Now close the command Prompt and again restart your computer for the changes to go into effect.

1. Cut out the caffeine.

2. **Give yourself a bedtime.** If you have kids, they have a bedtime based on how old they are, but most adults don't give themselves a bedtime. You are probably doing other things while you should be sleeping, because you have a busy life. Giving yourself a strict bedtime and sticking to it is a good way to make sure you get enough sleep.

3. **Don't drink!** If you want to sleep through the night, don't drink a lot of water right before you go to bed. This will save you from going to and from the bathroom during the middle of the night.

Some Advice from the NZ Police On Reducing Burglar's Opportunities



Knowing how a burglar thinks and operates is good background information to help put things in place to prevent you or someone you know becoming a burglary victim. The following information outlines some practical and simple steps to reduce the risk of being burgled:

* Set up or join a Neighbourhood Support Group in your area and advertise the fact by displaying Neighbourhood Support signs and stickers.

* Make sure doors, windows and other entry and exit points from your house have good quality, effective catches and locks - deadlocks if possible. Get into the habit of always using these locks

* Always lock doors and windows at night, if you're out in the garden or going out or away. Don't leave a door key hidden outside - burglars know all the places to look

* Keep garden sheds and garages secure and lock away tools and ladders

* *Have an alarm system professionally installed and

consider having it monitored by a reputable security company

* Install sensor lights on access paths or around main external doors

* Install a 'peep-hole' in a front door so you know who's visiting you

* Ask unannounced visitors who they are and what they want. If you're not satisfied with their answer, don't open the door to them

* Trim trees or remove shrubbery which might 'hide' a burglar's activity

* Get to know your neighbours and develop plans to deal with problems or suspicious activity. Exchanging phone numbers or emergency contact details is a good start.

* If you're going away, neighbours can collect your mail or newspaper and make your place look occupied, for example by turning on lights, parking a vehicle in your driveway, hanging washing on your line or mowing lawns

* Mark valuable property with serial numbers and keep a record of these numbers

* Consider placing "Beware of Dog" signs on gates or fences

* If you have an answer phone, don't record a message that suggests you're out or alone.

* Police are always interested in suspicious activity. Don't hesitate to call Police to report something out of the ordinary and, if you see a crime being committed, call 111.

* Above all, remember burglars like easy, tempting opportunities. DON'T overlook the obvious and DO all you can to reduce the risk of being burgled.

* If you, or someone you know has been burgled, it is best to take immediate action to improve the security of your home and reduce the risk of being burgled again.

* If you do see someone acting suspiciously in your neighbourhood ask yourself the following questions.

Have I seen this person in the neighbourhood before? [If you live in a cul-de-sac or a more rural location a non-local will be immediately obvious]

Does s/he look comfortable doing what they're doing?

Is there a sense of purpose to the person's activity? Do they look like they're going somewhere? Are they hesitant or even loitering?

What does the person appear to be looking at and why?

How did the person come to be in the area? Is there a car nearby, and if s/he is some distance from it, why? What's the car registration number?

Answering these questions and even taking notes about the person's appearance, clothes, height or other distinguishing features can go a long way toward identifying a crime suspect and making your neighbourhood a safer place to live.

- 2001, Madonna kicked off her Summer Drowned World Tour in Cologne, Germany.

- 1993, Janet Jackson started a six -week run at No.1 on the US album chart with 'Janet'.

- 1988, Eric Clapton's wife Patti applied for a divorce, the couple had married in 1979.
- 1988, The Pet Shop Boys played their debut live show when they appeared at London's Piccadilly Theatre as part of an Anti Section 28 Benefit concert.
- 1982, Roxy Music scored their third UK No.1 album with 'Avalon'.
- 1977, Alice Cooper's boa constrictor, a co-star of his live act suffered a fatal bite from a rat it was being fed for breakfast. Cooper held auditions for a replacement and a snake named 'Angel' got the gig.
- 1976, appearing at Celtic Football Club, Glasgow, Scotland, The Who, The Sensational Alex Harvey Band, Little Feat, Outlaws and Streetwalkers. Tickets cost £4 (\$7).
- 1971, Grand Funk Railroad smashed the record held by The Beatles when they sold out New York's Shea Stadium in 72 hours.
- 1971, Paul McCartney's second solo album 'Ram' started a two-week run at No.1 on the UK chart. Featuring the US No.1 single 'Uncle Albert / Admiral Halsey'.
- 1968, The Jimi Hendrix Experience appeared on the Dusty Springfield TV show filmed on ATV, in London, England.
- 1966, at the Marquee Club, London "The Bowie Showboat", a lunchtime performance from David Bowie, "three hours of music and mime", plus a Top Ten disco. Admission was 3 shillings, (\$0.42).
- 1965, The soundtrack album to 'The Sound of Music' started a 10-week run at No.1 on the UK chart. It re-

turned to the top of the charts on no less than 11 other occasions spending over 380 weeks on the chart.

- 1964, The Rolling Stones played their first-ever live date in the US when they appeared at the Swing Auditorium, San Bernardino, California.
- 1961, Roy Orbison went to No.1 on the US chart with 'Running Scared', it made No.9 in the UK.
- 1956, Elvis Presley appeared on ABC-TV's 'Milton Berle Show', and while singing 'Hound Dog' performed the suggestive 'gyrating' movements. The media go mad!

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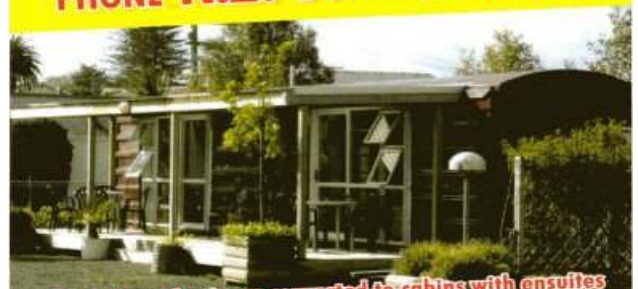
